LESSON TASK

INTRODUCTION (5 min):

Activating prior knowledge (1: Information and data literacy

1.1 Browsing, searching and filtering data, information and digital content).

Activity 1 (10 min):

Choose one of the following options:

1.a Create a new deck¹.

1.b Import a deck.

1.c Copy a deck.

If you want to copy or fork an existing deck then use the Fork button at the top of the Deck Tree (you need to sign in for this to appear).

You will be asked to confirm you want to Fork this deck before it is saved in your Decks.

Activity 2 (30 min):

Invite at least one of your peers to collaborate on the deck.

Deck editing rights

You can allow other SlideWiki users editorial rights to your Deck.

You will need to select the Edit tab within the Deck View to access editing rights for specific users and/or groups.

To alter editing rights for a user select:

User edit rights

Add users for edit rights: then select a user who has logged into SlideWiki by searching the dropdown list.

To alter editing rights for a group select:

Add groups for edit rights: these are created under My Settings and can contain any number of users. Select the user group available on the dropdown list.

¹ A deck is a collection of slides used for presentations, sharing and collaboration.

- To assess learners' **knowledge**:
Evaluate the created deck using the following criteria:
 - editing rights have been attributed;
 - peers contributed equally for the creation of the deck (not necessarily as regard the content but mainly as regards their participation at each stage of the process);
 - sources have been attributed;
 - playlists have been created and shared;
 - tags have been added.
